Paul's second letter to the Thessalonians, possibly a year later, continued to deal with Greeks who were not a stolid race, to put it mildly; and their enthusiasm sometimes broke out in riots. Sometimes those early Christians also did so enthusiastically. They had not learned all that being a Christian meant. Among other things, they still had to learn the relationship of Christ to the Father and the Holy Spirit. There was at that time no period of quietness in which their new faith could grow.

There was so much they still needed to understand, principally about the second coming of Christ and the need to keep on working until the Lord should return. Some had even quit working, thinking that if the Lord was going to return soon, there was no need to work. In simple words, Paul exhorted them to settle down, even though holding on to their enthusiasm.

Paul told them again that God had called them, saved them, and would keep them until — however and whenever— He would come for them. When Christ does come again, He will overthrow evil and bring rest and glory to His own. He will give Christians comfort and hope, even during persecution. God is good and will triumph! It is well, however, to realize that others besides persecutors will eventually suffer. That includes those who refuse to know God and reject the gospel.

Paul emphasized that no one except God knows exactly when Christ will return. No one but God Himself knows that day and hour! There will first be a rebellion against the faith. In the end time one will appear to do the work of Satan, opposing God and claiming divine honor for himself. In due course of time, God will do away with the forces of evil.

In the meantime, Paul exhorted the Thessalonians (and us) to work to earn their daily bread and not grow weary in well doing. Although humdrum, Christians should do their work well and live so that others, by following their example, would be led closer to Christ.•

Speaking in tongues

"How is it then, brethren? When ye come together, every one of you hath a psalm, hath a doctrine, hath a tongue, hath a revelation, hath an interpretation. Let all things be done unto edifying." I Corinthians 14:26

I like the Apostle Paul. He is a straightforward man. He tells things just like they are and he never candy-coats points of the Lord's doctrine.

As I was working in the yard one summer day, a gentleman stopped by to chat and started talking to me about his church. He told me that he could speak in tongues and that he could speak in tongues louder than anyone else in his church. I asked him, "What do you say?" and he said, "I don't know. No one knows what is being said, only God."

I immediately thought of these teachings of Paul in I Corinthians, chapter 14. Paul has been talking about spiritual gifts in the last couple of chapters, and in chapter 14 he talks about the difference in the gifts of speaking in tongues and prophesying. In verses 3 and 4, Paul says, "But he that prophesieth speaketh unto men to edification, in exhortation, and comfort. He that speaketh an unknown tongue edifieth himself; but he that prophesieth edifieth the church. Paul goes on to explain that if one is speaking in tongues, then someone else must be able to interpret what is being said or the speaking in tongues is worthless (verse 11). Paul says in verse 5 that speaking in tongues and prophesy are both good gifts but prophesy is "the greater gift because the church may receive edifying." I like the analogy Paul uses in verse 8; "For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle?" During battles, the horn would be sounded to go forward into battle, or retreat or some other command. But if the trumpeter would start to play "Mary had a Little Lamb," the soldiers would not know the direction the battle was headed. If someone is speaking in tongues and no one can understand it and be

edified, what worth is it?

In Acts, chapter 2, the Apostles were celebrating the day of Pentecost and verse 4 says, "And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Sprit gave them utterance." There were people from many different regions, speaking many different languages, but "every man heard and understood the Apostles speaking in their own language." The Apostle Peter explained to the people that the Apostles were not drunk, but guided by the Spirit as prophesied by the Prophet Joel.

Paul continues in I Corinthians to explain that if someone is speaking in tongues and no one can understand it, then the congregation cannot give their "Amen," or acceptance if they have no knowledge of what has been spoken. Paul says in verse 19, "Yet in the church I had rather speak five words with my understanding that by my voice I might teach others also, than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue." Paul teaches us that, "Wherefore let him that speaketh in an unknown tongue pray that he may interpret. For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prayeth, but my understanding is unfruitful. If any man speak in an unknown tongue, let it be by two, or at the most by three, and that by course: and let one interpret. But if there be no interpreter, let him keep silence in the church; and let him speak to himself, and to God" (I Corinthians 14:13-14; 27-28).

Open your scriptures, dear friends, and let these wonderful servants of God teach you. I encourage you to always pray before and after reading scriptures that the Holy Ghost may edify and enlighten your mind and understanding. I Corinthians 14:20: "Brethren, be not children in understanding; but in understanding be men." I am so grateful for the wonderful testimonies and teachings of these great prophets and apostles of God. I am grateful for divine tutelage. The Lord desires to teach us from on high each and every day if we will only make time for this wonderful blessing.•

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
