D r a i n Commissioner's have changed dramatically since the post was created in the 1800s. Originally, Drain Commissioners were concerned about draining land for development & agriculture; clearing trees, straightening streams to hasten flow, and draining wetlands. Even in the last 50 years, Drain Commissioners have been exempt from laws protecting the environment. They did not have to obtain wetland or inland lakes & streams permits nor follow soil erosion control practices to protect environmental resources.

Coincidentally, when I took office 3 years ago, amendments to state law eliminated many of these exemptions. Although it is still critical to maintain good drainage to protect public health and property, it can be done with environmental stewardship in mind. That is why this important position should have an individual with experience and training in natural resource management.
