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

Familiar faces will greet parade attendees this year as "Mr. and Mrs. Coach," Steve and Holly Wilson, assume the titles of King and Queen of Old Fashioned Days. As the football coach at Fruitport High School for 23 years with his wife by his side, Steve and Holly have come in contact

Steve was born in Flint, Michigan, one of four children. Holly was born in Muskegon; she has three sisters. Both attended Muskegon High School where Steve played football. Holly attended Michigan State University, originally in the veterinary medicine program, but transferred into education, receiving her degree in special education. Steve followed Holly in the education field, along with athletic coaching.

Steve taught at Muskegon High School for 11 years. While he was there, he wrote a program for computer literacy which he taught at both Muskegon and Fruitport. Holly was a special education teacher with the Muskegon Area Intermediate School District and an autism teacher consultant. Together, Steve and Holly have a combined total of 64 years of teaching and coaching.

The couple has been married for 40 years. Their son and daughter are married. They and their spouses are all special education teachers. The Wilsons have three grandchildren with a fourth expected in June. In addition to working with special education students at schools, Holly offered respite care in her home for families. The Wilsons often hosted special needs children, giving both their children and those of others an introduction to accepting and getting along with others, while giving families a much-needed

Although Steve coached the football teams, Holly was a key part of the program helping at the concession stand and wherever her help was needed. She received the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association's Fran Herrington Woman of the Year award in 2011, in recognition of the time, energy and patience needed in a coach's wife. She was always there to help and was always called "Mrs. Coach" by the players.

Steve and Holly are members of the Fruitport Congregational United Church of Christ. Steve has been on the Board of Trustees for 30 years, and Holly serves on the Christian Education and Stewardship/Mission Board.

It was the influence of the late Pastor Don Wood and the church men's group that ignited Steve's interest in building wheel chair ramps beginning in 1994. At first, the ramps were done through Love, Inc. Now Wilson's helpers are members of the Fruitport football team and

Steve has been a volunteer with the Red Cross and is a current member of the Fruitport Lions Club and Muskegon County Men Who Care. He is on the Fruitport Hall of Fame Committee and the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Board of Directors.
