2021 Season Recap

Fruitport, Spring Lake and the surrounding communities, you rock! Stand up and applaud yourselves for coming out and enjoying and supporting the 5th season of Dancing into Sunset Fruitport down at Pomona Park overlooking beautiful Spring Lake (Dancing into Sunset – Fruitport on Facebook). Our attendance once again increased tenfold. We averaged 250 plus each night, to well over 3,000 in attendance for the season, who came to listen and dance to live bands. And now, wait till you read this, over 84,000 views on Facebook (Yes, I went back and counted every single post and how many views it received this season), thanks to Diane Campbell for all her time of posting each week.

We kicked off the season with The Silverado Band followed by The Bourne Bros, who filled in at the last minute for Sonny Boone and his Valken Band, when the scheduled band had to pull out at the last minute. We will have Sonny and his band back in the lineup for season six. Then Mother Nature took control of the 3rd Thursday when The 6 Pak Band faced a rainy day into the evening, so we took a chance and rescheduled them for Tuesday, August 10th, with much success as the word got out for Tuesday, and produced a great crowd once again. Let's say Mother Nature liked following The 6 Pak Band on the rescheduled Tuesday night, since within a half hour of getting everything packed up, the skies opened up again! Whew! That was a close one.....!

July 1st was the week of our Salute to the Military and, like in years past, with the help and entertainment of The Silverado Band we had a fantastic evening! We collected non-perishable items through the week at Orchard Markets Fruitport and passed it along to The Blue Star Moms to send off to the troops. July 8th brought back The Bourne Bros Band for their regular scheduled date for all to dance, and then on July 15th was the return of The Adams Family Band for which a special, very special, moment came to light for one of our attendees. While the band played the song Runaway by Del Shannon, that tune hit the heart of Blanche Dykehouse. Why you ask? Well, Del Shannon (Chuck Westover) who wrote and sang that song for years, and is still played on the radio today, was her brother. When I received a call the following day from Roger, her husband, on how much that meant to his wife and how it bought, just for those few minutes, her brother back to life, she was thrilled! "It was just amazing!" he said. "The smile on her face, and that they will be coming down every Thursday as they are both looking forward to it," and, indeed they did and even brought family members with, too. One of the items in the book is a original dance ticket, with signatures of the gentleman who wanted to have the next dance with the holder of

the ticket, and a reminder that the last train car left at 10:13 pm back to Grand Rapids. Yes, right where we dance were the train tracks that lead down to the water in front of the Pavilion. One of Roger's stories is Blanche and he would bring their little boat right up to the Pavilion and park it underneath this one area to listen to the music. How special is that to be back dancing on the same grounds as she once did as a teenager.

In August was the return of Butch Grenell and the Unbreakable Pride Band, with his country style music for line dancing.

The second week of August brought to the park retired and active police and fireman with a sound board man to make sure all heard the band, and we sure did.....! :-)

As we approached the middle of the month, Woody, Cheryl and Tom of The Silverado Band once again played to the growing crowd. My, we have come a long way from only 40 to 50 a night back when we started in 2017!

Silverado Band usually is our last night but with Labor Day still being a week late, many had asked if I could run one more week in August. So I listened and booked a newcomer to Dancing into Sunset Fruitport, Steve Spees, on our Wesco Popcorn night where Tory, Luke and Allison took over passing out free popcorn buckets while they lasted. Very pleased was Steve Spees and those who ventured out to listen to this 'unknown to the area' entertainer, all got a nice surprise from his one man talent for the evening, and Steve appreciated the response from the audience of dancers and listeners. Saxophone accompanied as background music, and singing was easy for him along with a book of over 400 songs listed to request from, which many did. Overheard from those in attendance after the first half hour, they were on their phones telling family and friends, "to come on down, this guy is good." That's what this community does. I am so proud to represent a community who supports, appreciates, and is respectful to all those who put their heart and soul into entertaining all of us!
