They raised four children together at their home on Carr Rd in Fruitport. During the construction of their new home, Pat would walk from Russ's mothers' home (where they lived at the time) on Judson rd. pushing a baby buggy with her three young children in it the 12 miles to Carr Rd. to help with the plumping and electrical each day.

Pat held several jobs throughout her life. She was Secretary for several Fruitport Community Schools Administrators to include the Late Gene Randel, & Dr. Dan Bird. She was an exceptional secretary. She could type 120 words a minute with 98% accuracy. She would have to stop with the older electric typewriters and wait for it to catch up, she really excelled when computers came along. She could take dictation in Gregg shorthand or simple type as quickly as you were speaking. After leaving Fruitport Schools she worked as an office manager. Pat was respected and admired at the cable company. Every year at Christmas time she would bake cookies for the staff. Her chocolate chip cookies became legendary at work and at her church, no one could figure out how they tasted so good. Her children and Grandchildren have tried to recreate them, and they are close, but not quite there. Twenty years and 3 name changes later she retired from Comcast. Recently she attended a staff reunion for the cable company, they were disappointed when she showed up without cookies in hand. She thought it would be rude to bring them into a nice restaurant.

Pat was a lifelong member of Fruitport Community Church. As a child, she attended the church then named Fruitport Congregational Church, on the corner of Park & 6th in the Village of Fruitport. Many times, she would walk to church on her own so she could sing in the choir. Russell's mother Maudie was the choir director and told Russ that he needed to marry Patricia because he would never find another person better than her. When the new church was built on the corner of Park & 8th the name changed to Fruitport Congregational UCC. Russ & Pat were one of the first couples to be married at the newly built church. Pat has been the secretary, choir director, children's church coordinator, VBS teacher and any other task the church has needed throughout the years. Her group at vacation bible school was the youngest group. You would think that was because they were the easiest and wouldn't require as many projects. She would completely bury that theory. Her group painted, colored, used glue and scissors and made projects that the older groups were always jealous about. Her thought process was children can accomplish anything so long as you are willing to take the time to teach and show them how. She also never had an attitude problem with the young ones, when asked how she handled that she would respond I just keep them too busy to make trouble.

She was proud to accept the honor but wanted to keep the event an Old-Fashioned experience. Instead of riding in Lion Jim Feldt's beautiful convertible, the couple lead the parade riding in a horse drawn buggy wearing clothes representing the late 1800's.

Pat was an organizer. She worked part time for Cooperating Churches and organized food trucks throughout Muskegon County. She was extremely proficient in solving problems and facilitating tasks. She found a need, decided how to meet that need and organized the people and steps to fill that need. Those skills led her to help groups all throughout the area which also resulted in a nomination to be a woman of accomplishment in 2012, an honor she felt proud of and humbled by.
