What started as a normal day at Lake Michigan turned into anything but.

Our family of seven had gone for a fun day on the beach. My husband, who's not even much of a water guy, was all in... splashing in the waves, playing in the sand, and even letting us bury him completely.

We were laughing, focused on the mission of making sure not a single patch of skin showed. But then that "mom scan" kicked in — the instinct to count. One, two, three... number four was splashing in the shallows with her floaty... and number five? She was further out, without a floaty, her head barely above the waves, swallowing mouthfuls of water.

I ran faster than I've ever run straight into the lake toward my three-year-old. Her little eyes were locked on me, silently pleading for help. I pulled her up into my arms and rushed her to shore. She was red, bloated, and I was terrified by how much water she'd swallowed.

Right there, I began rebuking the enemy. Satan does not get to have my children. I prayed over her mind, body, and spirit, speaking life and declaring she would be okay... even when fear whispered otherwise.

God had Gracie in His hands. His hedge of protection was over her. She is okay; still okay. What happened yesterday was nothing short of supernatural intervention. A miracle.

I share this to remind you... be incredibly cautious near water. Things can change in a single second. But also to remind you that we serve a wonder-working God who hears us, cares for us, and covers us in His protection.
