

## **QURET**

This article is meant to enlighten people to a natural product I have come to love.

Several years ago after my mother passed, my sister and I were cleaning out her house. I found a small white glass container with a black metal cover. When I opened it I took a whiff and thought I'd take it home and check it out. It settled in with other first aid items for quite some time.

I don't remember when I first used it, but that half empty container was soon nearly gone. I started searching for it in the local stores. Finally I found it in Walgreens.

The pharmacist who retrieved it for me explained that it was invented/created in the early 1900's by an employee of Walgreens in Muskegon. For many years it was only available at Walgreens across the country.

More recently the patent was sold to a company in Grand Rapids and became available at many other stores.

My experience with Quret more recently proved it's effectiveness more than once. A cat attacked my arm, not bad but enough so I knew it had some mean claws! It drew blood in a couple places along with other wounds. This is where I got out the Quret. I put a small amount on the pad of the bandage and placed it over the sores. After 2-3 days I looked and the sores were healing.

Another time my assistant was complaining a little on Monday about a wasp sting she had gotten at a yard sale on Saturday. The lady shook the cat off her hand and the damage was extensive leaving a string-like tendon hanging down. We went to ER and they cleaned and stitched it up. Bandages were to be changed daily and the doctor expected infection with more surgery in the near future. They didn't give anything to keep the pad from sticking to the wound so I pulled out my Quret. When we went back to the doctor for checkup, the doctor was pleasantly surprised at how well it was healing. Consequently, no additional surgery was necessary.

Some people use Quret for pulling slivers, and it helps there, too!
